## PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION

February 3, 2016

The Merrill Parks and Recreation Commission met on Wednesday, February 3, 2016 at 4:15 p.m. at the Merrill City Hall.

\*\*\*Motion by Sukow, seconded by Artac to approve the minutes from the October meeting.

\*\*\*Motion by Sukow, seconded by Schroeder, to approve the claims.

Public Comment: None

Mike Willman stated that agenda item #7 would be the next item on the agenda that is discussed.

The next item on the agenda is a request form former Ministry Good Samaritan Wellness Program for space. Wendorf stated that he would have Mayor Bialecki talk about this item. Mayor Bialecki stated that he was approached by the group from Ministry Good Samaritan Wellness Program in need of some space to continue the Wellness Program after the service was discontinued by Ministry. Mayor Bialecki stated that after this became public knowledge Diane from Kindhearted Home Care approached the city with a possible solution, stating that she would be willing to move the program into her new facility if it would work out. Wendorf stated that there would be no room at the Smith Center to move the program in there. Diane will continue working on a solution for the program.

The next item on the agenda was a continued discussion and potential action on Bike Route Designation and Pedestrian Routes. Wendorf stated that he has come up with alternative routes and additional routes for the bike and pedestrian routes using the Bike Ped Plan. Wendorf stated that any new routes would need to be approved by the Board of Public Works. Sukow stated that even if they are approved there is no money in the budget for signage. Wendorf stated that at least if they are approved when money becomes available they can put signage up. Wendorf stated that they have \$10,000 to work with for signage on approved routes right now.

\*\*\*Motion by Artac, seconded by Sukow to road diet Center Avenue, to change 4 lanes to 2 lanes with a turn lane in the middle with designated bike lanes from the roundabout to Hwy G. Recommendation to send to Board of Public Works.

\*\*\*Carried Unanimously.

**\*\*\*Motion by Artac, seconded by Schroeder to mark both sides of Grand Ave. from the Three Arch Bridge to Marc Drive for a bike route.**

**\*\*\*Carried Unanimously.**

**\*\*\*Motion by Sukow, seconded by Artac to designate a route on Theilman St. from Pine Ridge Ave. north to Memorial to East 6<sup>th</sup> west to Blaine Street, South to 2nd Street, which would take you to the route that is already established.**

**\*\*\*Carried Unanimously.**

**\*\*\*Motion by Artac, seconded by Sukow to go from East 6<sup>th</sup> Street to Park Street to meet up with the River Bend Trail.**

The previous 4 motions are for those area to be designated as bike routes.

**\*\*\*Carried Unanimously.**

The next item on the agenda was an update on disc golf initiative. Wendorf stated that he has met with Eric Pfantz regarding cost of disc golf course and fundraising ideas. Wendorf stated that he will be meeting with Pfantz again to go over some more ideas with fundraising and sponsorship. Wendorf stated that they are looking at getting basket sponsors, hole sponsors and different level of sponsorships. Wendorf will bring back more information at the next meeting.

The next item on the agenda was to discuss Park Rental Policies. Wendorf stated that every year this item is brought up on who pays for the parks and if there are any discounts for non-profit organizations. Wendorf stated that in the past every organization pays the same price. Wendorf stated that, according to Commission action fro 2014 if it is a Merrill entity they do not have to pay but they still have to fill out all the paperwork. Merrill City Band does not have to pay to utilize Normal Park because they are funded by the City of Merrill but Gazebo Nights would have to pay to utilize the park. No action was needed.

The next item on the agenda was monthly board reports. Wendorf asked if anyone had any questions. Sukow stated that there was a tree on Jackson and John that needed some attention with a big branch. Ravn asked if any pool passes were sold. Wendorf stated a few have been.



# Stange's and Kitchenette Park Disc Golf Course Initiative



## What is Disc Golf?

- Similar to traditional ball golf
- Throw a golf disc from a tee location towards a target
- Aim to make it into the goal with as few throws as possible
- Winner has the fewest throws at the end of the round

## What is Needed to Play?

- Golf Discs (specially designed "Frisbees")
- An above ground disc catcher, commonly called a "basket"
- Tee off location, typically a concrete slab with a sign showing the shape of the hole

## Why Play?

- provides a purpose to a walk in a park
- light competition between friends
- fun, relaxing activity for all ages
- low cost recreation
- safe and easy aerobic and conditioning training

## Who Can Play?


Men, women, and children of virtually all ages can play disc golf.

The simple rules allow beginners to immediately have fun challenging themselves and their friends.

Disc golf skill may revolve more around form and consistency rather than athletic ability or geometric proficiency.

Perhaps the greatest factor behind disc golf's broad accessibility is its low cost. Players require little more than a \$10-\$20 golf disc to play and most courses are located in public parks, meaning there are little or no admission fees.

The bottom line is, disc golf is fun for everyone regardless of age, gender, or economic status.



## Community and Park Benefits

Disc golf has a high benefit to cost ratio. In addition to nearly universal access and appeal, the sport has low environmental impact and serves a large number of people at low cost.

A 9 hole course can facilitate recreation for anywhere between 10-30 people at a single time.

Disc golf courses will populate the parks and discourage mischievous park guests.

Courses can coexist with other activities such as hiking and dog-walking.

Disc golf creates very little noise pollution.

Local businesses can benefit from out of town guests to the courses looking for a bite to eat and maybe a new disc or accessory to purchase.

Players will utilize the River Bend Trail to travel between courses and will likely visit the downtown area and businesses along the way.

Disc golf courses can fit into existing parks with little need for tree removal or landscaping.

Courses tend to utilize underused areas in parks, including thick woods and slopes.

Players often care for courses and will pick up litter and encourage others to use trash receptacles.

## Who Can Play?

You'll find men, women, and children of virtually all ages playing disc golf. The rules are simple to grasp, allowing beginners to immediately have fun challenging themselves and friends.

Perhaps the greatest factor behind disc golf's broad accessibility is its low cost. Players need nothing more than a \$10-\$20 disc, and since most courses are located in parks, there are little or no admission fees.

Bottom line: disc golf is fun for everyone regardless of age, gender or economic status.

## Goals

Our current goal is to install a 6-hole loop in Stange's Park and a 3-hole loop in Kitchenette Park, these two loops combined create a 9-hole course.

Future goals include improving the Riverside Park course, and installing more courses in Merrill including at least one world class 18-hole course.

Ultimately we would host "The Park City Open" a tournament that would utilize all of the courses during a week long festival.



# Stange's Kitchenette Disc Golf Course

## **What is Disc Golf?**

Disc golf is similar to traditional ball golf and shares many of the same qualities: fresh air in a beautiful landscape, the competition and company of friends, and time to relax and clear one's mind.

Players use specially designed golf discs instead of balls and clubs, and an above the ground target instead of a hole in the ground. There are different types of golf discs used for different purposes, much like ball golfers use different clubs.

The object of the game is to throw a golf disc into the target in the fewest number of throws.

The player begins by "driving" from a designated concrete tee area down the fairway until within comfortable putting range. A successful "putt" sends the disc into the target, and the hole is completed.

Players face a combination of challenges including, distance, accuracy, wind, trees, shrubbery, water, and terrain changes, which offer plenty of action and excitement during an average round.

## **Benefits of Disc Golf**

Disc golf's high benefit-to-cost ratio makes it a positive choice for Merrill. The sport is environmentally friendly and serves a great number of people for a very low investment of time, energy and financial costs.

Disc golf courses differ from ball golf courses in that they fit into the existing flora of the park. They tend to utilize areas within parks that are otherwise underused, including thick woods and slopes, yet can easily co-exist with other activities such as hiking and dog-walking.

There is almost no noise pollution created, and players take care of their course, cleaning up litter and reminding others to use trash receptacles.

Installing a course also creates extra traffic in areas which might otherwise be remote, providing a year-round human presence and deterrent to mischief-makers.

Finally, for less than the cost of installing one tennis court which can serve four people at a time, Merrill can install a 9-hole disc golf course which can serve a minimum nine people at any given time all year-round.

## **Wisconsin Disc Golf**

Wisconsin currently has 271 disc golf courses ranking 3rd in the nation for number of courses. Our state has had the honor of hosting one PDGA World Championship as well as two Amateur Championships.

Highbridge, WI is home of the largest disc golf complex in the world consisting of six full courses. Wisconsin is also home to Sandy Point Resort and Disc Golf Ranch described as disc golf heaven and home of the Wisconsin Disc Golf Hall of Fame.

As the sport continues to grow tourist dollars will also continue to flow to the communities that offer the most high quality courses and tournaments. With an established base we can continue to grow on our states reputation and success as a leader in disc golf.

## **Merrill DG**

Merrill DG is the Merrill area disc golf club. We would like to organize a league system, hold clinics for beginners, and host tournaments.

Our main goal is to unite the community and put Merrill on the map as a premier disc golf destination.



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### March 2016 Parks & Recreation Director's Report

**Parks:** With the recent weather trends we have been ramping up our efforts to finish all repair work to our picnic tables and equipment. We want to ensure that when the conditions are right that we are ready to begin exterior work on our buildings and grounds. After the rain right before the weekend of February 20<sup>th</sup> we had to shut down our outdoor rinks. The warm weather and light rain caused the condition of each of our rinks to deteriorate. It was a short outdoor rink season, but for the month and a half we were able to open, we had great ice and great usage. I have been working quite a bit with our IT Director, Ron Turner on Aquatic Center technology items. We have been navigating through admissions software for the front ticketing area and generation of passes, point of sale software for the Concessions area, and all of the ancillary items that goes with that. There are a lot of working parts to running an aquatic center, but we want to make sure that we use technology to make it easier on all of us to keep track of people and money. By utilizing technology it will allow us to spend less time trying to devise our own system of keeping track of everything. I have been in contact with Miron Construction and they are planning on returning in early March (hopefully the weather stays consistent) to begin working towards the finish line. There are still plenty of items to finish on the aquatic center, but they are still ahead of schedule and will finish inside the allotted time. I have also been working on all of the remaining "soft cost" items including: tables, chairs, office supplies, lifeguard supplies, first aid supplies, safety supplies, etc. I am working with Lincoln County to make sure we secure our permit and comply with all of the regulations that we need to. I have also been working on a Facility Manual that will be used by everyone working at the aquatic center. It will incorporate lifeguarding plans, emergency protocols, incident responses, what to do in certain situations, who to contact, when to contact them, There are a number of new things that we will need to operate the new facility and I am working to ensure that everything is taken care of. The aquatic center has been a very time consuming project over the past few years, but I am very excited to finish and open the doors for everyone to enjoy this summer. I met with the Disc Golf group last week to continue discussion on the project and associated fundraising efforts. We reviewed a couple of different brochure options they had been working on and I have included them for you to review as well. The idea is to see if there is any interest out there for financial support for this cause. This brochure gives everyone a good idea of what the cause is, how much it is going to cost initially, and how you can get involved.

**Forestry:** With the weather starting to trend slightly warmer, I have to make time to inspect more trees and mark to be trimmed. The Street Department has been out when time has allowed, and they have been slowly been catching up on old lists. I always want to make sure that stay far enough ahead of them. I am going to apply for a new grant that I found from the Fruit Tree Planting Foundation, based in Pennsylvania. Their grants are for fruit trees only and are non-monetary. This would be a perfect opportunity to start an initiative I have been wanting to try for a number of years now; a Fruit Forest.



The idea of a fruit forest is fairly unique, as there are not that many of them but they have tremendous educational value as well as community value. Seattle, WA has one of the nicest fruit forests in the world. It is called The Beacon Food Forest and is absolutely amazing the thought that went into the establishment of this in a large city. It can be replicated here to a smaller scale but still be a very neat part of our community (in my opinion). There are a few stipulations including: provide volunteers to help plant, educational component, access for public, must remain a free resource, we must be municipality/non-profit, and we must be committed to caring for the trees in perpetuity. I think it is worth a try if they are going to give us free fruit trees. I would also like to be as aggressive as we can this year with tree planting. This will include some summer plantings while we have summer help, which I typically don't like to do too much of because of the need to water but if we can get assistance from adjoining property owners it will allow us to do so.

**Recreation:** Thanks to Dawn, we have a great jump on our 2016 Summer Recreation programs almost ready to go. We are going to continue finalizing all of the details and make sure we have covered all of our bases and will be ready to promote very soon. We are going to partner with the Merrill Courier once again this year to be able to distribute our programs to a wider audience than we normally would. Promotion is the key to growing our programs and increasing participation. I think we have another very strong line-up of programs again this year. We have very good diversity and a good overall set of programs for everyone to enjoy. We have some great bus trips this year as well that we have been able to expand upon because of great participation and feedback. We also have our annual Easter Egg Hunt coming up at Lion's Park on March 26<sup>th</sup>.


**Smith Center:** Ice time will begin to wind down next week and we will soon be removing the ice. We have been very busy during the day as we always are at the end with classroom trips out to skate. This has been very popular for us each year at the end of the season. It typically takes us a full week to remove the ice, clean the floor, remove glass and corner boards, and get things shaped up for dry floor season events. We have a very busy schedule to start the spring season off with a number of events including: Ladies Lifestyle Expo, Children's Festival, and a Day with the Princesses to name a few. We have finished our water heater replacement project finally and they have all been working great. Once we shut down the floor chiller and remove the ice, we will have Mechanical Inc. come in and go over all of our equipment. After running for 6 full months I always like them to come in right away to inspect things to make sure they look OK. By inspecting right away, it allows us to identify any issues early (if they exist) and get them resolved before we need to start making ice again.


# PROPOSED BIKE ROUTE #1


# PROPOSED BIKE ROUTE #2


# PROPOSED BIKE ROUTE #3
